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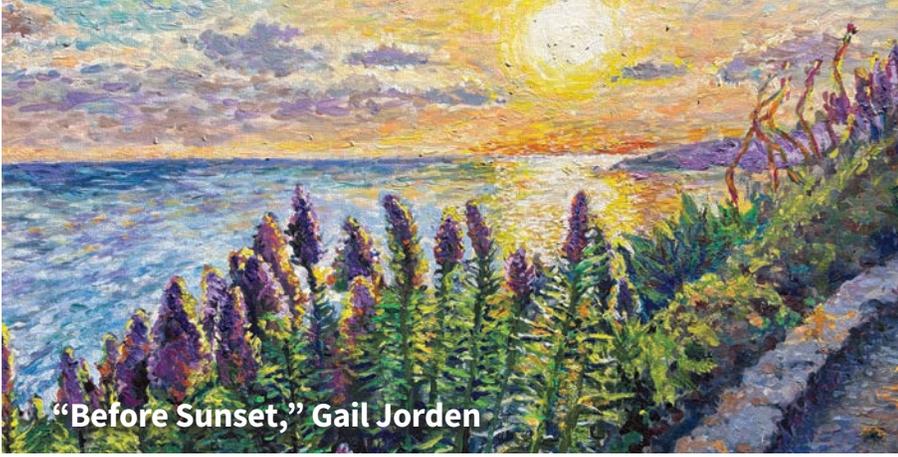

# Getting Where You Need to Go

Navigating Laguna Woods Village is simple and convenient. Whether you're running errands, attending an activity or heading out for an evening event, there's a transportation option designed to meet your needs. From fixed-route buses to after-hours ride services and specialized paratransit for eligible residents, the Village offers several ways to help you remain active and connected.

Below is an overview of available transportation services.

- **Easy Rider:** The Village's fixed-route bus system provides reliable transportation throughout the community and to nearby shopping and medical destinations.
- **Boost powered by Lyft:** Available during hours when fixed-route buses are not operating, Boost provides on-demand rides through the Lyft smartphone app.
- **Journey paratransit service:** Journey offers personalized transportation for approved residents.

Those interested must complete an application and professional assessment to determine eligibility.

# WHO SHOULD YOU CALL FIRST?

Medical emergency? Accident? Fire? Theft? In a stressful moment, the hardest part is often knowing who to call first, 9-1-1 or Village Security Services. Let's keep it simple.

## WHEN TO CALL 9-1-1

If there is immediate danger, call **9-1-1** first. Always. This includes medical emergencies, accidents, crimes in progress, fires, disaster response and any situation where someone is at imminent risk and every minute counts.

When you call 9-1-1, you reach dispatchers at the Orange County Communications Center, who route your call to the fire department, paramedics and/or the Orange County Sheriff's Department as needed. The OC Sheriff's Department has served as the City of Laguna Woods' contracted law enforcement agency since 1999. This matters because the sheriffs and fire departments have training, authority and resources that Village Security does not, including:

- Emergency medical response coordination
- Crime scene investigation
- Missing person searches
- Disaster response

## Attend Monthly Town Halls

The Golden Rain Foundation of Laguna Woods (GRF) board of directors launched its first monthly town hall in January and will continue to hold them monthly on the third Wednesday from 1 to 3 p.m., excluding August and November, in the Clubhouse 1 Main Lounge.

Residents are encouraged to attend to share comments and ask questions related to community amenities and shared spaces directly with board members.

## WHEN TO CALL VILLAGE SECURITY

Call Village Security first at **949-580-1400** for non-emergency situations, including:

- Assistance with leaks
- Noise complaints
- Lost property
- Parking concerns
- Gate clearance issues
- Wellness checks, such as when a neighbor has not been seen or heard from in several days and you are concerned

## WHEN TO CALL THE SHERIFF'S NON-EMERGENCY DISPATCH

For non-emergency crimes that have already occurred, such as vandalism or theft, residents should contact the Sheriff's Non-Emergency Dispatch at **949-770-6011**.

## FRUIT TREE AND VEGETABLE POLICY CHANGES

The United and Third boards of directors recently updated the Village community's Fruit Tree and Vegetable Policies (Resolutions 01-25-108 and 03-25-176). Here's a quick overview of what has changed:

### **Fruit Trees at Resale**

- When a home is sold, any existing fruit trees must be removed.
- New homeowners may not keep fruit trees planted by previous owners.
- The mutuels will remove these trees at no cost to residents.

### **Common Use Areas**

- Planting fruit trees or vegetables in common-use areas remains strictly prohibited.

### **Vegetable Removal**

- The updated resolutions reiterate that any vegetables found in these areas must be removed.

### **Why the Policy Change**

Fruit trees and vegetables attract rodents such as rats and mice, and even coyotes, which are drawn to fallen fruit and other food sources. Reducing fruit trees and keeping common areas free of edible plantings helps limit pest activity and supports a cleaner, safer environment for all residents. These policy updates are designed to protect the community's health and safety.

### **Tips to Deter Rodents and Coyotes**

- Keep outdoor areas clean by promptly removing fallen fruit, seeds and food scraps.
- Make sure trash is fully secured inside dumpsters and pick up any debris that falls on the ground.
- Store birdseed, pet food and similar attractants in sealed, rodent-proof containers.
- Never feed wildlife. This is prohibited under Laguna Woods Municipal Code Section 5.20.070.

Delete Request and Opt-out Platform

## Delete Personal Data From Hundreds of Brokers

Californians now have a powerful new way to reduce unwanted emails, texts and scam calls. A new state-run platform allows residents to request the deletion of their personal data from more than 500 registered data brokers with a single, free submission.

The new tool, known as the Delete Requests and Opt-Out Platform, or DROP, is the first of its kind in the nation and is designed to give consumers more direct control over how their personal information is collected, sold and shared.

### HOW DROP WORKS

DROP puts into action the Delete Act, a law passed by the California Legislature in 2023. Through the platform, residents can submit one request that is sent to every registered data broker operating in the state.

With a DROP request, consumers can ask data brokers to delete personal information they hold and limit the sale of that information going forward. The platform is free and accessible online.

### A FIRST-IN-THE-NATION APPROACH

California is the first government anywhere in the world to offer a centralized data deletion request system of this scale. It is also one of only four states,



along with Oregon, Texas and Vermont, that require data brokers to register with the state.

### WHAT DATA BROKERS MUST DO

Under the Delete Act, data brokers are required to register annually with the state and comply with deletion requests submitted through DROP. They must also disclose the types of data they collect and share and undergo audits to confirm compliance. Companies that fail to follow the law may face administrative penalties and fines.

### WHAT HAPPENS AFTER YOU SUBMIT A REQUEST

Beginning August 1, 2026, data brokers will have 45 days to process deletion requests submitted through DROP. Consumers can check the status of their request through the platform to see whether their data has been deleted.

Users can add additional personal information to their request at any time. New submissions may take up to 90 days to process. The DROP website also provides educational resources about data brokers and consumer privacy rights.

# Beware the 'Glue Trap' Mail Scam

Residents are encouraged to remain alert for mail scams involving glue traps and other misleading solicitations. In this scam, criminals place glue traps or sticky devices inside public mailboxes to steal letters and envelopes before they are officially collected.

## How the Scam Works

Criminals insert a glue mouse trap or adhesive device into a mailbox slot. A sticky strap or tool is then lowered into the box to snag mail as it drops in, particularly checks or items containing sensitive information. The stolen mail may be used to alter checks or harvest personal or financial data. Similar "mailbox fishing" techniques have been reported in other communities.

## How to Protect Your Mail

- Deposit mail inside a post office and hand it directly to a clerk.
- Avoid using street collection boxes for checks or important documents.
- Before mailing, check the slot for any sticky residue or foreign objects. If something appears unusual, do not use the box and report it to local law enforcement or the U.S. Postal Inspection Service.
- Monitor bank accounts and credit reports regularly for unauthorized activity.

## Other Common Mail Scams

- Imposters posing as government agencies, financial institutions or utilities
- Prize or lottery notices requesting payment or personal information
- Unsolicited offers that seem too good to be true
- Fake charity solicitations that closely resemble legitimate organizations
- Urgent notices demanding immediate action or threatening penalties

## General Safety Tips

- Be cautious of mail that creates a sense of urgency or fear.
- Do not send money, checks or personal information to unfamiliar senders.
- Verify claims by contacting companies directly using known phone numbers or websites.
- Shred suspicious mail and report concerns to appropriate authorities.

## Report Mail Fraud

Mail fraud is a federal crime. For questions or to report suspected mail scams or theft, contact the U.S. Postal Inspection Service hotline at **877-876-2455**, option 2, or submit an online report at **uspis.gov/report**.

# WHERE THE VILLAGE

**B**eyond recreation, Clubhouse 1 is one of the Village's most versatile meeting and event spaces.

Multiple rooms accommodate club meetings, classes and

lectures, while dining rooms and the main lounge can be reserved for private events. Some rooms open directly onto a patio with barbecue facilities, making them ideal for casual gatherings. Depending on setup, dining rooms can host up to 38 people, while the main lounge can accommodate up to 300 for lectures or 220 seated at tables.

The Drop-In Lounge, now a familiar and much-loved feature, has its own history. It first came into existence in August 1975, sponsored by the Institute for Living and originally located in

Dining Room 2. The space was remodeled in 2013 and again in 2025, evolving with the needs of the community while preserving its role as an easy, welcoming place to pause, connect or simply spend time.

Coffee is available weekdays, making the lounge a natural stop before or after a workout, meeting or class.

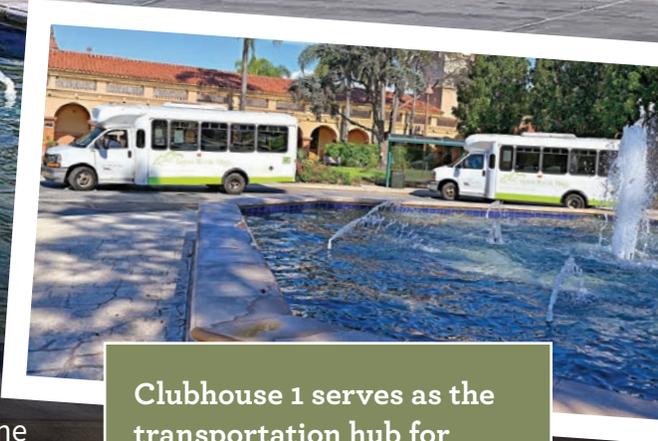

Clubhouse 1 also serves as the transportation hub for the Easy Rider bus system, reinforcing its role as a central connector within the Village. Residents passing through may be heading to a class, a club meeting, a medical appointment or simply home again, all intersecting in one shared space.

## **MORE THAN A BUILDING**

For more than 60 years, Clubhouse 1 has adapted to the changing interests and needs of the community while remaining true to its purpose. It is active without being intimidating, social without being overwhelming and familiar without feeling static. In a Village filled with remarkable amenities, Clubhouse 1 stands out not just for what it offers, but for what it represents. It is where history lives alongside daily life, and where the Village continues to come together, just as it has since day one.



Clubhouse 1 serves as the transportation hub for the Village bus system. **W**hen it comes to senior discounts, one simple rule applies: It never hurts to ask. In fact, it often pays to ask which discount is best. A seasonal promotion may save you more than a standard senior rate, and in some cases, discounts can even be combined for greater savings.

Don't wait for an establishment to offer a discount. Sometimes employees aren't aware one exists until they check with a manager. While some discounts begin as early as age 50, most start between ages 55 and 65.

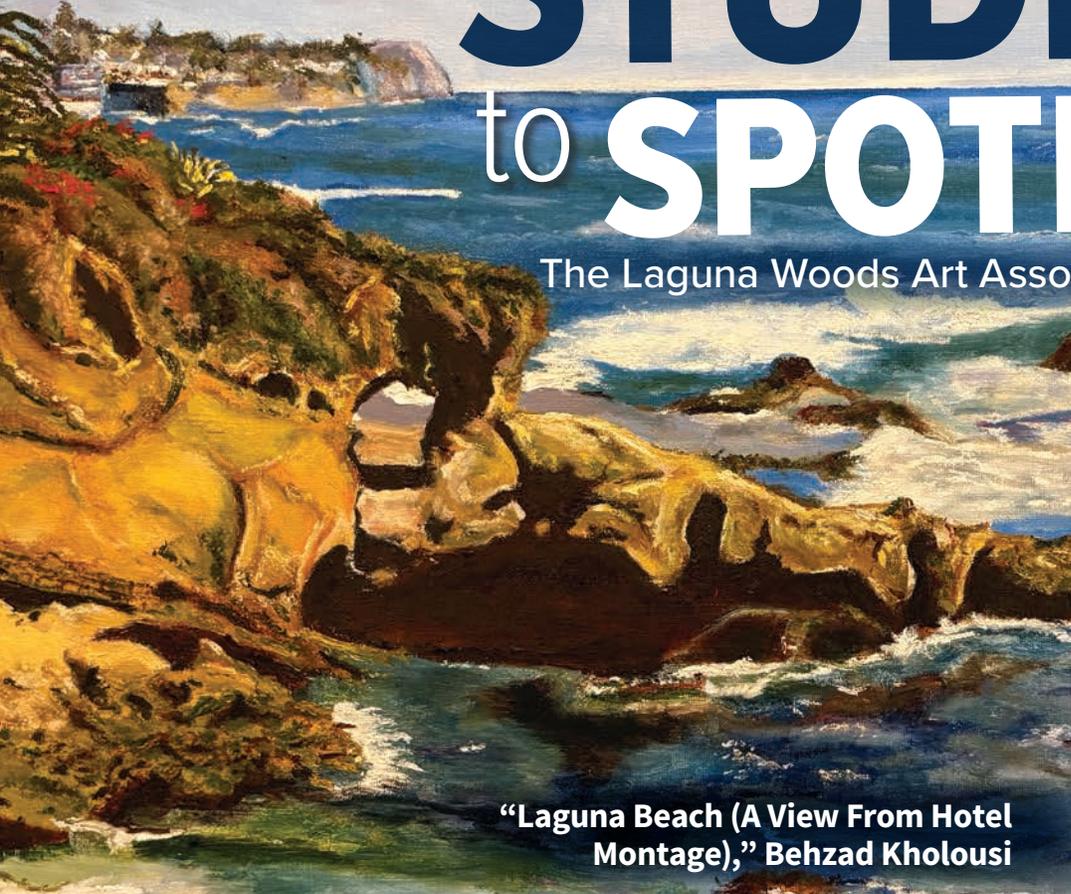

“Laguna Beach (A View From Hotel Montage),” Behzad Kholousi



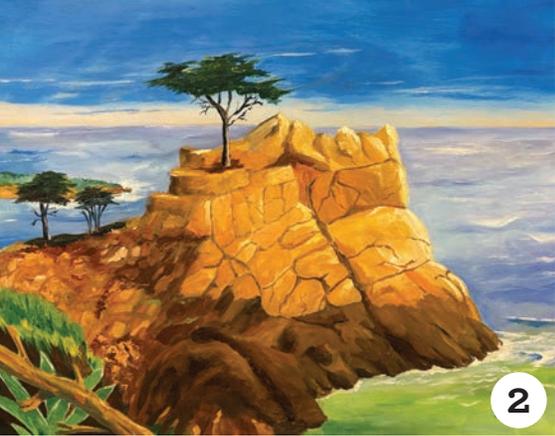

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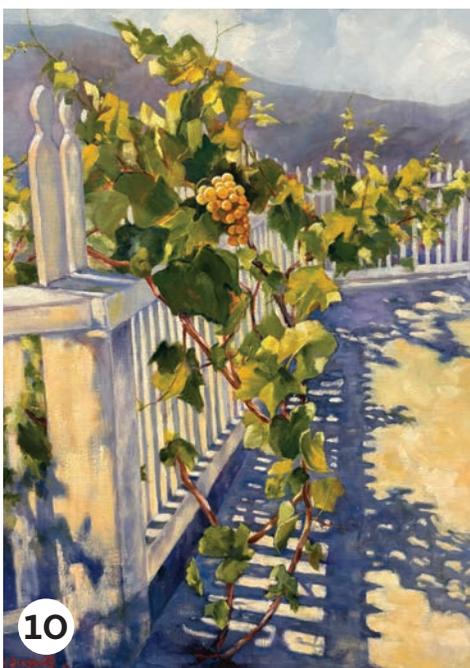

# TO THE ENDS OF THE EARTH:

## A Visual Journey to the Planet's Wildest Places

Camera Club marks 60 years with an extraordinary presentation by wildlife photographer Todd Gustafson.



**W**hat comes to mind when you hear the phrase “the ends of the Earth”? Remote landscapes. Fragile ecosystems. Wildlife few people ever witness firsthand.

In celebration of its 60th anniversary, the Camera Club of Laguna Woods Village invites residents to embark on a remarkable visual journey with acclaimed wildlife photographer and filmmaker Todd Gustafson. His presentation, “To the Ends of the Earth,” offers an intimate look at some of the planet’s most remote and vulnerable habitats

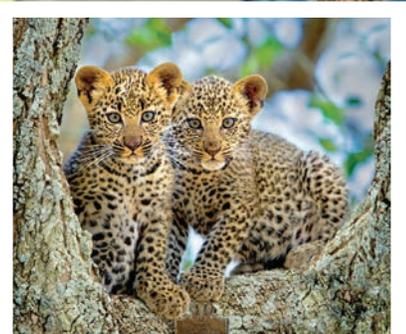

through sweeping photography and cinematic storytelling.

The program includes a videotaped introduction by the late, world-renowned primatologist and conservationist Jane Goodall. Gustafson pairs breathtaking imagery with insight into the patience, fieldcraft and technical precision required to capture fleeting moments in the lives of wild animals. Those moments, he explains, reveal both the beauty and the urgency of protecting species and habitats for future generations.

#### THE LIFE OF A NATURE PHOTOGRAPHER

Raised in Tanzania, Gustafson has spent more than two decades photographing wildlife and natural history around the world. Since 2007, he has focused on creating his limited-edition, leather-bound “To the Ends of the Earth”

book series, a three-volume collection featuring “East Africa,” “Birds of East Africa” and “The Natural World.” The series has been praised as among the most visually striking nature publications in recent decades.

In 2015, Gustafson traveled extensively to gather images and film footage for his “To the Ends of the Earth” documentary. His deep understanding of wildlife behavior, respect for fragile ecosystems and collaboration with local communities lend authenticity and depth to his work.

Through film and photography, Gustafson draws audiences into the daily rhythms of the natural world as animals forage, migrate, raise their young and struggle to survive in rapidly changing environments.

## SPEED DATING

How does our speed dating event differ from WWW? Each independent event requires separate registration, but you are welcome to attend both events if applicable.

Upon arrival, the ladies proceed directly to the event rooms to avoid any awkward pre-event interactions with the men. The men check in at the front desk with a Springboks representative and wait comfortably in the lobby of 19 Restaurant & Lounge until they are called into the rooms once the

ladies are seated and ready.

The rooms are elegantly prepared with black tablecloths, black chair covers and a large fuchsia pink ribbon on each chair designated for the ladies. Each of the 12 tables is set with a vase of pink roses and a numbered table stand. A bell signals the end of each three-minute round, and the men rotate to their next partner.

The event is hosted in two one-hour sessions. The first group arrives at approximately 5:30 p.m., and the second group at

6:30 p.m. Matches are guaranteed within 48 hours; however, most participants receive their matches within 24 hours. Based on past events, we continuously refine our process and assist with next steps after matching. We encourage follow-up email correspondence with Springboks one day after the event for questions, feedback or clarification. You may want to include some additional items; for example, a battery pack for your cell phone or a battery-operated radio. You should also periodically check your bag and replace items as needed.

**SIGN UP FOR ALERTOC**

AlertOC is Orange County’s official emergency notification system, which sends messages via text, phone call, email and app alerts when a wildfire threat, evacuation order or other urgent incident is in your area. You choose how you want to be contacted.

To enroll, visit [AlertOC.org](http://AlertOC.org) and register your phone numbers and email addresses. Once signed up, you will receive real-time updates from public safety agencies—often before social media or news outlets.

Neighbors helping neighbors stay safe starts with you.

**M**ore than a year has passed since the devastating wildfires touched so many lives in Southern California. The heavy winter rains this season might make wildfires feel farther away, but the threat hasn’t disappeared. Wildfires can still ignite quickly and being ready matters.

Even in greener months, dry conditions can return quickly, and wildfires can ignite with little notice. As Village residents, let’s remember to take two simple but powerful actions now—before an emergency—to protect ourselves and our loved ones.

**PREPARE A ‘GO’ BAG**

A “go” bag is your personal grab-and-run kit, a backpack or duffel you can take in minutes if you are asked to evacuate. It should be easy to grab and hold items you might need for 72 hours. [Ready.gov/kit](http://Ready.gov/kit) recommends go-bag essentials such as these:

- Food and water: for example, protein bars, instant oatmeal, dried fruit, nuts and seeds, and a three-day supply of water (at least one gallon of water per person per day)
- Personal hygiene items such as toothbrush, toothpaste, wet wipes and deodorant
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- First-aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Prescription medicines plus copies of prescriptions
- Important documents (IDs, insurance information, medical records, passport, driver’s license and insurance cards) sealed in a waterproof bag
- Cash in small bills and a list of emergency contacts
- Cell phone charger (portable power bank)





# PAYING YOUR INVOICE OR ASSESSMENT?

Here's what to know to avoid duplicate charges.

Laguna Woods Village residents have several convenient options for paying chargeable service invoices and monthly assessments. Understanding processing timelines and available payment methods can help ensure payments post correctly and prevent duplicate charges.

## ALLOW TIME FOR PAYMENTS TO POST

If you make a credit or debit card payment through the resident portal for a chargeable or assessment invoice, please allow up to four business days for the payment to post to your account.

During that four-business-day window, please do not return to the portal to submit another payment. Submitting a second payment before the first has posted will result in a duplicate charge to your card.

If an invoice still appears outstanding more than four business days after you've submitted payment, email [ar@vmsinc.org](mailto:ar@vmsinc.org) before making another payment. The Accounts Receivable team can review your account and confirm the status to help avoid additional charges.

If a duplicate payment does occur, staff must manually process the refund. Once requested, refunds may take up to seven business days to be credited back to your account.

Payments made by check and sent by mail may take up to 10 business days to post, depending on mail delivery and processing times.

## CHOOSING THE RIGHT PAYMENT METHOD

Residents may pay chargeable service invoices by credit or debit card through the resident portal without incurring a credit card service fee.

Monthly assessments may also be paid by credit or debit card; however, a 3.5% service fee is applied by the credit card company for assessment payments.

For residents who wish to avoid that fee, EZ Pay offers a convenient alternative. EZ Pay is an automatic bank draft program administered by the Golden Rain Foundation of Laguna Woods and is the most efficient way to pay monthly assessments. There is no service fee for payments made through EZ Pay.

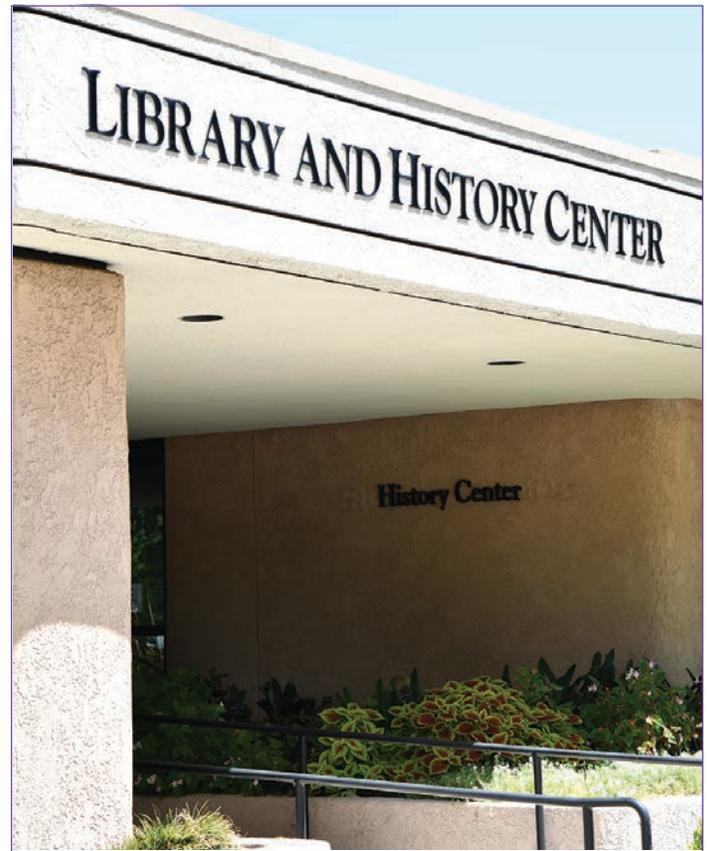

## HUMAN POWER

Understanding the role of the GRF board and how residents govern Laguna Woods Village

Have you ever wondered how major decisions are made in our Village, from budgets and policies to long-term priorities? Laguna Woods Village is a resident-governed community, and the Golden Rain Foundation of Laguna Woods board of directors plays a central role in shaping the quality of life residents enjoy. GRF is responsible for maintaining common areas, clubhouses, swimming pools, roads, security, communications and recreational facilities.

The GRF board is made up of 11 volunteer resident directors. Directors from United Mutual, Third Mutual and Mutual No. Fifty are elected by their respective memberships, while GRF directors are elected by each mutual's board. This structure ensures all residents are represented in the governance of the Village.

### COMMITTEE GOVERNED

In addition to their board responsibilities, directors serve on multiple committees that oversee nearly every operational, financial and strategic aspect of our community. Committees do the detailed



work, such as studying issues, evaluating options and making recommendations so the board can make informed, responsible decisions on behalf of all residents.

The chart on this page shows the GRF committees and their core responsibilities. Together, these committees form the backbone of our resident-driven governance system.

COMMITTEE	CORE RESPONSIBILITIES
Broadband Committee	Provides oversight of television, internet and broadband services across the Village.
Community Activities Committee	Oversees recreation, club operations, room reservations and entertainment programming that enrich daily life in the Village.
Disaster Preparedness Task Force	Plans and prepares for emergencies such as earthquakes, fires, floods and other large-scale events.
El Toro Water District Liaison	Monitors water usage, conservation efforts and district coordination affecting the Village.
Energy Ad Hoc Committee	Reviews Village energy usage and explores strategies for efficiency and cost management.
Executive Hearings Committee	Hears and addresses compliance violations that occurred at GRF facilities.
Finance Committee	Reviews budgets, financial statements, reserves and long-term financial planning to help ensure fiscal stability.
Information Technology Advisory Committee	Guides technology infrastructure, systems and services that support Village operations and resident communication.
Laguna Woods Traffic Hearings	Hears and rules on traffic violations and related resident appeals.
Landscape Committee	Oversees tree maintenance, irrigation, turf and overall common area landscaping throughout the community.
Land Use Ad Hoc Committee	Reviews highest and best use of unimproved land for future revenue.
Maintenance and Construction Committee	Reviews building systems and infrastructure including roofing, plumbing, HVAC, electrical and major repairs.
Mobility and Vehicles Committee	Supervises transportation services including buses, vans, fleet vehicles and resident mobility support.
Security and Community Access Committee	Focuses on gate operations, access control and community safety.
Select Audit Task Force	Reviews Village spending and financial controls to ensure accountability and transparency.
Space Planning Ad Hoc Committee	Evaluates and recommends allocation of space for staff programs and community use.

Our boards and committees depend on resident participation to remain strong, well-managed and financially sound. ## ALLIES IN FIRE PROTECTION

How we work on many fronts to keep the Village safe

Winter rain brings beautiful green lawns and hillsides with much-needed water. Enjoy our lush hillsides and landscapes featuring our beautiful green wonderland.

Later, when winds and summer's high heat dries out this vegetation, it can become fodder for possible fires if we don't manage it.

The VMS Department of Landscaping Services staff and its contractor thoroughly groom the Aliso Creek area three times a year. GRF pays for these services negotiated with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW).

As Southern California residents, we are all concerned about fire safety. Past wildfires prompted United Mutual members to inquire about efforts to protect the community from fire hazards. While natural disasters can't be prevented, we collaborate with allies to assist us in such events. The Augurisk Wildfire Hazard index, which assesses

the potential for wildfires at the U.S. Census block level, reported that United Laguna Woods has a low wildfire risk. While that is comforting news, that doesn't negate our responsibility to mitigate that risk.

### OUR WATER

Laguna Woods Village receives its water from the El Toro Water District (ETWD), which has developed detailed emergency response plans over the past 20 years. The district collaborates extensively with other water districts to ensure additional water can be supplied to the ETWD system in cases of emergency.

ETWD staff and volunteers participate in mock emergency response training to ensure preparedness for a variety of emergency scenarios. Backup generators are routinely tested, as is the functionality of fire hydrants. Their staff members receive thorough training in emergency readiness and maintain comprehensive response plans. ETWD acknowledges the critical importance of reliable water systems during fire emergencies. As part of their response plans, they acquire additional equipment, inspect current equipment and pump stations, and assess vulnerabilities to ensure these are addressed effectively.

### A NEW FIRE STATION

The City of Laguna Woods is working with the Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) on a long-term lease of approximately 0.32 acres of the 0.56-acre City Centre Park property (24121 Moulton Parkway, Laguna Woods, CA 92637) for use as a new OCFA fire station. OCFA plans to build a new Fire Station 12 near Moulton Parkway and El Toro Road. The City of Laguna Woods and OCFA reached an agreement early in 2026 to begin negotiations for construction.

quick response times. OCFA Operations Division 5 serves Laguna Woods, Aliso Viejo, Laguna Hills, Laguna Niguel and Lake Forest with stations ready to respond.

Southern California firefighters work closely with the El Toro Water District and other responders and are skilled and efficient in their duties. For over 60 years, Laguna Woods Village has experienced few house fires and no wildfires.

The new fire station would operate in addition to the existing Laguna Woods fire station on Paseo de Valencia. The city council approved the ground lease agreement with the Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) during its regular city council meeting on December 17, 2025.

Two fire stations surrounding our village would allow for nearly instant deployment to our retirement community for emergency services.

The nearest existing fire station is on Paseo De Valencia, enabling

### LANDSCAPING SERVICES

The VMS Department of Landscaping Services collaborates with OCFA to address landscaping concerns and maintain standards. The Village landscape passes annual OCFA inspections and meets fire mitigation recommendations. Although several members have expressed concerns over trees in proximity to their residences, OCFA responded: “OCFA will not mandate the removal of any living trees; well-maintained, mature and watered trees



can actually provide ember protection in the event of a wildfire.”

“We can only enforce vertical separation of trees from the ground or vegetation underneath to prevent a ground fire from climbing into a tree,” said Field Operations Director Kurt Wiemann.

**PROPERTY INSURANCE  
COVERAGE, RISK AND COST**

Laguna Woods Village uses the services of major brokerage firms to help secure and place property insurance in the community. Part of the services they provide involves assessing our risk and recommending appropriate coverage limits.

Insurance costs are rising, with companies paying large sums to rebuild after natural disasters. We need reliable brokers for this essential purchase. United pays about \$3 million annually for coverage up to \$225 million per occurrence, with multiple occurrences covered if needed. Our community has never faced such events, but we must pay this amount to protect the Village. Each year the property insurance coverage is renewed, and premiums may increase based on market conditions which would impact HOA monthly charges.

**PURCHASE HO-6 INSURANCE**

We recommend obtaining a

condominium owners (HO-6) insurance policy, as your personal property, additions and alterations are not covered by United cooperative insurance.

Members are responsible for damage to mutual property caused by the members’ misuse or neglect, by additions or alterations, or by guests or lessees. If the damage is your responsibility, United Mutual can charge you for the repairs. If the repair costs exceed the deductible on the mutual’s insurance, currently \$100,000, a claim will be submitted to the mutual’s property insurer. HO-6 insurance can help you avoid paying these costs out of

pocket. Consult with your agent about your insurer’s practices and increasing your policy limits accordingly.

**WORKING TO KEEP US SAFE**

Stay diligent and responsible to reduce fire risk. Report any maintenance or landscaping concerns to Resident Services. Immediately call 9-1-1 for emergencies. If advised by emergency personnel, evacuate immediately.

Ensuring the safety of residents and structures is an important community responsibility. Working with our allies who assist us in such events can help maintain security.

How the GVA represents the interests of three-story building residents

Attend a Third Mutual board or committee meeting and the importance of the Garden Villa Association becomes clear. GVA exists to represent the interests and needs of residents living in three-story buildings.

GVA monitors proposed rule changes at the committee level and provides input on how those changes may impact our members. ## INSURANCE EXPLAINED

What the mutual covers and what your condominium owners (HO-6) policy needs to cover

After speaking with many Third Mutual members, it has become clear that there is confusion about what property insurance is maintained by Third Mutual and what individual condo owners must cover through an HO-6 policy.

### WHAT THIRD MUTUAL MAINTAINS

Third Mutual currently maintains \$275 million in property insurance, excluding earthquake, landslide and similar perils. This coverage is shared in part with United Mutual. Third and United jointly insure the first \$225 million, with Third securing an additional \$50 million on its own.

A common question is why the mutual carries \$275 million in coverage when the total value of Third Mutual's condominiums is significantly higher. The answer lies in probable maximum loss, or PML. PML is determined through independent risk modeling and estimates the maximum loss likely to occur in a single event. For Third Mutual, the current wildfire PML aligns with the \$275 million coverage level, meaning the mutual is considered adequately insured based on that modeling.

This property insurance carries a \$100,000 deductible per occurrence and is intended to cover the cost of rebuilding a manor. If a fire damages one or more condominiums, whether partially or fully, the

mutual will rebuild the structure to its original design. Any square footage added beyond the original plans is the responsibility of the owner to rebuild.

If damage or destruction is caused by an owner or tenant, the owner is responsible for reimbursing the mutual for the deductible paid toward rebuilding. This is one area where an HO-6 policy can provide important protection.

In addition to property insurance, Third Mutual maintains the following policies:

- **Commercial general liability:** \$1 million per occurrence, \$2 million aggregate, \$25,000 deductible
- **Crime/fidelity insurance:** \$31.5 million for employee theft, computer and fund transfer fraud; \$50,000 deductible
- **Earthquake insurance:** \$10 million, deductible equal to 5% of building value with a \$100,000 minimum

### WHAT YOUR HO-6 POLICY SHOULD COVER

A common question is what you, as an owner, are responsible for insuring. While an HO-6 policy is optional, it is strongly recommended.

If damage originates from your unit or from an alteration you made, you may be fully

responsible for repairs to other units and to mutual property. For example, there have been recent cases in which an altered ice maker line leaked into the unit below. The leak went undetected until the ceiling in the lower unit collapsed. In one instance, repairs to mutual property affecting two condominiums exceeded \$14,000. The owner of the unit where the leak originated was also responsible for damage to the personal property in the unit below. An HO-6 policy provides critical protection in situations like these.

When purchasing an HO-6 policy, owners should discuss with their insurance agent the appropriate coverage limits, deductible and the amount of special assessment and loss of use coverage needed.

- **Special assessment coverage** helps protect you if the mutual ever requires a special assessment. While no special assessment has occurred in the history of Third Mutual, that

does not guarantee one will not be needed in the future.

- **Loss of use coverage** is important if your manor becomes uninhabitable and you must temporarily relocate. This coverage helps pay for the cost of alternative housing.

### WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

When you purchased your condominium, you assumed full responsibility for any alterations made to the unit, whether completed by you or by a prior owner. Owners should review these alterations with their insurance agent to determine the level of coverage needed to rebuild the unit to its pre-loss condition.

We hope this overview clarifies the respective responsibilities of the mutual and individual owners. This article is not all-inclusive, and owners are encouraged to consult their insurance agent to fully understand their responsibilities and ensure appropriate coverage.

# A SCULPTOR IS BORN



Like many Village artists, David Bialobroda did not discover his artistic gift until after he and his wife moved to Laguna Woods in 1988. As a new resident, he enrolled in a free sculpting class at Clubhouse 4.

“I would have never paid for it,” he said. “I did not think I was talented.”

For Bialobroda, sculpting became the fulfillment of a childhood fascination. Growing up in Poland, he spent hours watching a local tombstone carver create intricate faces and forms from stone. He peppered the craftsman with questions: How do you make a nose? How do you shape an expression?

When his hands first pressed into clay decades later, those early lessons resurfaced. The memory of the carver’s guidance returned, and with it, an unexpected talent.

Bialobroda went on to become a respected sculptor whose work was exhibited internationally. Several of his pieces were later donated to the Laguna Woods History Center, where they remain on display. Before relocating to Israel in 2006, he left behind a legacy rooted in the community that first nurtured his artistic awakening.

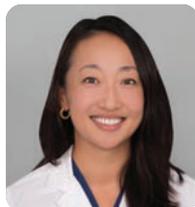
